# Just follow these simple steps...

You will need:

- a location
- some guests
- ingredients for the lunch of your choice
- a generous serving of donations

## Step 1

### **Choose your location**

If you don't yet have a venue for your Lent Lunch, here are some suggestions:

### Church or village hall

Why not hold a Lent Lunch in your church? Set up tables in your village hall and invite your local community to lunch! You could ask a few other members of your church to help out and request a voluntary donation from guests for every bowl of soup or plate of food.

#### At work

Spice up the workday with a curry lunch! Let everyone know the date you'll be providing lunch in advance. Or encourage them to enter their own dishes in a tasting competition – that way you won't have to do all the cooking.

#### At home


Hold a blind-tasting soup competition at home. Ask family and friends each to make a soup, and blind taste to pick a winner. The chef with the fewest points does the washing-up!

### At school

Get your school involved! Add a global dimension to learning about food. Explore ingredients from around the world with international recipes and help students understand why raising money for charity is an important way to help bring justice.

### In the wider community

You could even get your local café or a nearby restaurant to dedicate their daily special to Christian Aid, donating their profits to help communities worldwide lift themselves out of poverty.



### Step 2

# Invite everyone for lunch

- Download an editable poster from our website and add the details of your Lent Lunch. Display it on your church noticeboard, or put one in your local shop, café or office. Get your poster at caid.ie/lent
- Download invitations from caid.ie/lent and hand them out to guests or send them by email.

### Raise as much money as possible

# You can raise even more money by:

- Asking your guests to give a suggested amount for the soup. If this is the case, and you're in Northern Ireland, please let us know when paying in the total – we can't claim Gift Aid on this type of donation.
- Letting your guests decide if they'd like to make donations. If they do, and you're in Northern Ireland, please ask them to complete the donation form

   including ticking the Gift
   Aid box – to make sure that every pound raised counts even more.

### Share Eva and Lope's story at your lunch

### Rise up with Lope and Eva against the tide of climate change this Lent





Thanks to your generosity, Lope and Eva have hope for the future

Fisherman Lope and his wife, Eva, once struggled to compete with the illegal fisherfolk – who use dynamite to fish, destroying the fragile ecosystem on which the community depend.

In 2013, Super Typhoon Haiyan – one of the biggest tropical storms ever recorded – shook the community to the core. Homes, livelihoods and families were torn apart. The shifting weather patterns bring storms like Super Typhoon Mangkhut, which was even more powerful than Haiyan, and pounded the Philippines in September 2018.

Thanks to the generosity of people like you, Christian Aid's partner, ICODE, provided food and essentials so that the community could rebuild ans sustain itself.

Eva joined a savings group – so when times are hard, she can still pay for their children's schooling.

Lope is well and is fishing again - and facing up to illegal fishing. With a note of defiance in his voice, he says: 'There was no justice, so we gathered as one to create a force to be listened to.' With training from ICODE and a patrol boat equipped with solar lighting, Lope is leading the fightback as local leader. And he's grateful for the difference your support has helped to make, saying:

### 'Thanks to the patrols and the new reef that ICODE helped create, the fish have returned.'
